2 Bodies From Lost Tug Washed Into L.I. Waters

HUNTINGTON, L. I., April 11—The body of the mate of the 100-foot tug Gwendolyn Steers, which sank with nine persons aboard in Long Island Sound off here during a storm last Dec. 30, was found at 6 A.M. today at the entrance to Centerport Harbor.

Another body, which the Suffolk County police believe to be that of another crewman on the tug, was found two hours later on the shore of nearby Smithtown Bay. Bodies of two others had been found previously.

The body of the mate, Robert Nolan of Hicksville, L. I., was found by an unidentified bayman. Tentative identification was established through papers in his pockets.

The tugboat, owned by the Steers Sand and Gravel Company of Northport, had been en route from New York Harbor to Northport Harbor with nine men aboard when she apparently foundered near the entrance to Huntington Bay.
