STEAMER PENTAGOET LOST?

Bangor Boat of the Manhattan Line Not Heard from Yet.

BANGOR, Me., Nov. 29.—The steamship Pentagoet of the Manhattan Line, plying between New York and this city, it is feared, has foundered at sea or been wrecked at some point on Cape Cod, where communication has not been re-established.

The Pentagoet left New York last Thursday, and was reported to have passed Highland Light, on the end of Cape Cod, at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Since then she has not been heard from, and as the gale started soon after that time here, she was probably caught in it. Agent H. C. Quimby of the line says he has not given up all hope of hearing from the ship, although his theory that she was in Provincetown Harbor has been dispelled.

The Pentagoet has 150 tons of freight, but no passengers. She-is commanded by Capt. Orin Ingraham, and her crew numbers fifteen men. She was built in Philadelphia in 1864. Her length is 128 feet; breadth, 23 feet; depth, 16 feet; gros tonnage, 332.
